Reflections on 2018

Reflection upon the activities throughout 2018 is a great reminder of the enormous effort from volunteers and the community. Much has been achieved this year thanks to the increase in community engagement and volunteer participation. Here's a summary of some of the things we have done this year...

In April, the Guardians of the Otago Peninsula group was established. Permanent traplines were formed in Sector 5 which are monitored and managed by

the Guardians.

This group is pivotal in ensuring that possum activity is controlled to prevent reinvasion onto the broader peninsula. They have achieved much in a very short period.

This year we found the need to ensure that our volunteers and wider community are safe in handling pest traps so that they can undertake their work confidently and safely.








Our tracks are vital in our operations so this year we undertook a series of volunteer days cutting and maintaining tracks. We had a variety of organisations participate; crews from the University, local businesses and of course, regular outings with our reliable and hardworking OPBG track cutting volunteers. Without these tracks, we would not be able to achieve our goals.

By spring our possum monitoring was in force. Using chew cards, we managed to identify some hotspot areas and, supported by our operations team, removed several more possums.



At the beginning of spring our second **Bird Call Workshop** was hosted by former OPBG Chair, Rod Morris. His engaging workshop sought to prepare us for the Bird Monitoring season by helping us to



identify a variety of birds through listening to their unique calls. Thanks to Rod and the Portobello Marine Centre for hosting another great event.

Predator Free Dunedin Launch

Predator Free Dunedin's official launch took place in early October with an event held at the Otago Museum, where Conservation Minister Hon. Eugenie Sage announced the Predator Free 2050 funding for this ambitious project. The first project in the South Island to receive funding it will be used to achieve predator-free status over an area 31,000 hectares. The funding will contribute to the five-year, \$15 million Predator Free Dunedin project. OPBG, as one of the delivery partners, has laid a solid foundation with a total of over 17,000 possums removed from the Peninsula. Operations Update

The OPBG Operations team is still in full swing trying to get to those elusive possums in hard to get to places. Habitat hotspots are being targeted at Boulder Beach and surrounding cliffs, Okia Flats, many of the Peninsula tracks, including the steep and slippery gullies and bush corridors and the Sector 5 buffer line.

The Cumulative Grand Total as of 31st October 2018 comes to 17,075 possums.

We continue to call on all of you to report any possums that you have trapped, seen or heard and we now have a dedicated new email – still going to Brenda as usual though – so please start using this from now on to report your catches and sightings:

Although these had the right shape, but we had never seen them in these colours before. It was at the height of the pine pollen season and that was the main food source for the possums in that area...and (right) possums do come in a wide range of colours as well, but you don't come across an albino very often.


OPBG History Project
